



Learn to combine two mediums, encaustic wax and acrylic paint. The goal of the workshop is to leave with completed pieces both on canvas and watercolor paper. You will be amazed at the depth and texture you will achieve and help you think outside the box. This is a hands on workshop for all skill levels in any medium. Students who have existing acrylic works who would like to take them a step further by applying wax, are encouraged to bring them with you. No experience is necessary as this workshop lends itself to all artistic levels. All materials are included. We will start from the beginning with acrylic and wax in different formats. Bring your imagination and snacks/beverages for self-regulated breaks.

The course includes:

Demonstrations of using acrylic on paper and canvas with the application of encaustic wax afterward. Also demonstrations of the reverse.

Hands-on application of acrylic paint to paper and canvas, followed by application of wax.

Hands on application of wax to panel followed by application of acrylic paint.

MEET THE INSTRUCTOR DOUGLAS MEHRENS


Douglas Mehrens has been painting with encaustic/wax for over 40 years, and teaching all levels of encaustic/wax for more than 10 years.
